## PART ONE. CONTINENTAL AND COLONIAL CURRENCY I. CONTINENTAL CURRENCY

The Continental Currency emissions, commencing with notes authorized by the May 10, 1775 Session of the Continental Congress, represent our first federally issued paper money. These issuances provided the financing that made the American Revolution possible. Emitted across 11 specific resolutions, the notes were a promise to pay, bore no interest, and were to be redeemed with taxes levied by the individual United Colonies. The notes circulated concurrently with the colonial paper currency issued by the individual colonies, forming a medium of exchange to finance the revolutionary war. The expression "not worth a Continental" arose when the notes essentially became worthless due to inflation toward the war's end. The long delay in the creation of the Federal "greenbacks," necessitated by the Civil War in 1861, is directly linked to the lack of confidence caused by the devaluation of the Continental Currency.
The Continental Congress met in Philadelphia and authorized the first Continental Currency notes during the May 10, 1775 Session; these notes, as well as all other subsequent resolution dates, were printed by Hall and Sellers in Philadelphia. The layout and style were similar to those of Pennsylvania notes from the period. The thick rag paper, with mica flakes and blue fibers, was produced at the Ivy Mills in Chester, Pennsylvania and was also used for other Pennsylvania issues. Using various combinations of border cuts, emblems, hand set type, and nature print designs popularized by Benjamin Franklin, the notes had a uniform style throughout the emissions, with one exception. Unique to the May 10, 1775 Session was a Twenty Dollar note printed on a special marbled edge paper obtained by Benjamin Franklin. The size ratio was different from the other issues and the note featured face and back designs using motifs sketched by Franklin.
Continental Currency, with the exception of the aforementioned May 10, 1775 Twenty Dollar note, was printed in panes of eight notes, on double sheets (i.e. sixteen impressions), hand signed and numbered. There were over 290 different signers performing this
tedious task. The first usage of "UNITED STATES" appeared on the notes from the May 20, 1777 Resolution. The rarest notes come from that issue and the subsequent emission of the April 11, 1778 Resolution when the Congress met at Yorktown, Pennsylvania. The final resolution of Continental Currency, January 14, 1779, saw the introduction of vastly higher, and sometimes unusual (\$35, \$45, \$55, and $\$ 65$ ), denominations up to $\$ 80$ due to inflation; it was printed with red and black ink on watermarked paper.

Contemporary counterfeits of a number of the notes exist; a few of these were quite well made and deceptive. This first instance of economic warfare by the British was done with the intent of destabilizing the currency. Hall and Sellers printed special unissued sheets of Counterfeit Detector notes on blue paper to help thwart this enemy action.
The Continental Currency series has always been popularly collected. There are 102 notes required to complete a full set. Although they are all obtainable with varying degrees of effort, the rarer issues can be extremely difficult to find in top condition. This series is particularly intriguing as it comprises our first federal paper money. Forming an entire issue date and denomination set is within the reach of completion by many collectors.
Notes: Counterfeit Detector notes should be designated by the notation DT after the catalog number, e.g., CC-85DT. Contemporary Counterfeits should be designated by the notation CF after the catalog number, e.g., CC-85CF
The values listed herein are for problem free examples of their respective condition, which also retain their original paper quality. In other words, the prices are for notes which are pristine for the grade. Notes exhibiting any splits, tears, stains, repairs or other flaws are worth less, sometimes much less than the prices listed here.

## II. COLONIAL CURRENCY

From 1690 until the ratification of the United States Constitution, paper currency notes emitted by the original Thirteen Colonies and the State of Vermont circulated in the emerging United States of America. Known as colonial currency, it was replete with numerous emissions and printing styles, many regionally influenced. The notes were essential for commerce due to the scarcity or complete absence of coin, and to pay troops during wartime. The notes often feature mottos and themes that reflect the distinct character of the issuing colony. Those of the Revolutionary times utilize many different patriotic mottos, such as "Don't tread on me," to symbolize the ideals of freedom. Many different vignettes were also used, such as the Liberty Cap, to represent the ongoing struggle for independence. State Arms supplanted those of England. Printers and engravers, such as patriots Benjamin Franklin and Paul Revere, were directly involved with the creation of colonial notes and examples of their work are among the most widely collected. The seeds of the American Revolution and the struggle for freedom are embodied in the colonial notes of this era.
The early colonial notes prior to 1750 bore little resemblance to the majority of notes that were issued during the Revolutionary War period from 1775 until the surrender at Yorktown in 1781 Commencing in 1690, with two very short emissions, the Massachusetts Bay Colony introduced paper money to North America in order to pay her troops for military action against Canada. These notes, meant to be a temporary measure and nearly all redeemed, were larger in size than most notes produced decades later, and were printed on thin laid paper. Since that experiment was a success, such Bills of Credit were emitted by Massachusetts, the other New England Colonies, New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania often times in defiance of British Crown authority. Early colonial notes from the south were also issued, but styled much differently than those from the northern colonies. Almost all the Bills of Credits from the 1740 and prior should be classified as very rare to extremely rare.
The colonial notes most familiar to collectors had their genesis with the introduction of the Franklin printing press, which facilitated larger emissions of notes by Pennsylvania, Delaware, and New Jersey from the 1740s through the late 1760 s. The paper used was mostly thick and coarse, unlike the earlier laid paper. Many notes became so worn that they split, resulting in their being pinned or sewn together to further their use. The B. Franklin and D. Hall imprint was widely used in the Pennsylvania notes produced during this time.
The New Jersey notes from the 176 os were used extensively to pay troops waging the Seven Years War. The sizes and overall style of these notes are very similar to the Revolutionary period notes that follow.

The vast majority of colonial currency that remains extant was printed between 1770 and 1785. The Continental Congress emitted notes that circulated concurrently with notes from the colonies during the Revolution. Some of the most famous colonial notes of this period were made in Massachusetts and feature the workmanship of Paul Revere. Revere produced engraved copper plates commencing in 1775 and, soon after, created plates for notes featuring the "Sword in Hand" patriot, one of the most iconic images from the American paper currency genre. The notes of Ceorgia were also remarkable from the outset of the Revolution as they used colorful and patriotic seals such as Justice and the Liberty Cap as their key elements.
As the Revolution continued, inflation necessitated the issuance of higher denomination notes. At $\$ 2,000$, Virginia produced the highest denomination note of any colony in 1781. Usually, notes were denominated in Pounds-Shillings-Pence. Some colonial notes, particularly after 1775, were denominated in Spanish Milled Dollars, the well-known "Pieces of Eight." Other times, the notes were denominated in both English and Spanish money. The inflation of the Continental Currency in 1780, fixed at a ratio of \$40 old to \$1 new helped usher in a special act creating "State funded Guaranteed by the United States" notes to redeem many of the Continental notes.
The peace in 1781 did not end the colonial note series abruptly. Instead, there was a transition period where the several early states printed notes in the style of their earlier colonial status. Traditionally, these "bridge" notes have always been collected in the colonial series. Certain municipalities, such as New York City and Charleston, emitted their own notes. Private banks commenced in 1782 with the chartering of the Bank of North America which emitted Pence change bills in 1790, a necessity for commerce prior to the Mint's production of copper coins in 1793.
Colonial American and Continental paper currency is an integral part of American financial history, essential to the development of the Federal "Greenbacks" issued at the outset of the Civil War and the paper money used today. The notes from each of the Thirteen Colonies and Vermont are often quite different from one another, yet all possess an aura of history that makes this period intriguing. They are tangible reminders of iconic American patriots such as Benjamin Franklin and Paul Revere. Their direct role in the financing of the American Revolution makes them among the most affordable and interesting artifacts of this era available to collectors.
Note: Prior to 1752, the new year began on March 25th rather than January 1st. In the instances where a note was issued between January 1st and March 24th prior to 1752, the catalog listings show both the old style year (the date printed on the note) and the new style year, e.g., February 3, 1690/91.
